

Ferns and palms banked the altar for the ceremony, for which fifty friends and relatives were present. present.

For the entrance of the bridal party along the white aisle. Miss Mable Partington played the Lohenmaster Partington played the Lonen-grin music. Preceding the service, Miss Maxine Malone sang "At Dawning" and "I Love You Truly" as the processional left the church. She gave "Ave Maria" during the offertory.

The bride's sister, Miss Rosa Laux, The bride's sister, Miss Rosa Laux, wearing coral lace over -coral crepe, attended her as maid of honor. The dress was long and sleeveless, with the high throat line in front and the low back, outlined by a flat collar of the material. With it, she wore a blue sash and a wide brimmed hat in the same tone finished with a little bow flat. tone, finished with a little bow flat against her hair, and she carried Columbian roses. Miss Frances Laux, another sis-ter of the bride, in cream lace over green, and Miss Margaret Aylward,


in flesh lace over peach, were the bride's maids. The designs of the bodices followed the shirtwaist bodices followed the shirtwaist mode, with short sleeves and Peter Pan collars, and the skirts were long and simple. The maids' lace hats were of the material of their frocks, with the bows bending with their girdles. Miss Laux' being green and Miss Aylward's peach The former had an arm bouquet of Premier roses and the latter Talis-Premier roses and the latter Talisman roses.

The little flower girl. Kathleen Davis of Omaha, was frocked in white organdy and wore a large white hair bow. Richard Fenton of Lincoln was

Mr Michaels' groomsman. White satin was used for Mrs. Michaels' bridal gown, with its diagonal princess lines falling into a train at the back. The bodice had calla lily neckline and the sleeves were large puffs to the elbow, where they were caught into long tight. they were caught into long tight cuffs, finished with a narrow ruf-fle over the hand. Her long Veil, falling beyond the train of her gown, was of white tulle, fash-ioned into a cap for her head, with a double row of orange blossoms forming a bandeau which was caught on either side with small clusters of the flowers. She carried a shower of white roses and sweet peas.

A wedding breakfast followed at the home of the bride's parents, 5612 Morrill avenue, for a smaller group of guests. Mrs. Mollie Young and Mrs B T. Overton arranged the breakfast and Miss Julia Brennick was in charge of the service. The was in charge of the service. The was in charge of the service. The table appointments were in pink and white, with the wedding cake as the center piece. At either end were silver baskets of pink roses. Mr. and Mrs. Michaels have gone

to their home in Oshkosh to reside. The bride is traveling in white crepe with navy blue accessories.

JAMES AUGUSTINE "GUS" MICHAELS & JOSEPHINE LAUX

Gus was the first Child born to Louis and Mary Frances "Matthews" Michaels on September 9, 1902. Josephine was the daughter of Joseph & Maude "Young" Laux of Lincoln Nebraska.

Gus married Josephine "Laux" on August 21, 1934 In St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Lincoln Nebraska. They lived in Oshkosh Wisconsin for 7 years where Gus worked. They eventually moved back to Indiana. They had 3 children while living in Wisconsin, Jim, Mary Jo and Tom. After they moved back to Indiana, they had the fourth child Elizabeth Ann. Josephine passed away on Dec. 13, 1996 and Gus passed away on Jan. 25, 2001 at the age of 98 years old. Both are buried in St. Peters Cemetery near the Plaza Cross on the North Section of the Cemetery.

- 1. **James Joseph Michaels Sr.** was the first child born to Gus and Josephine on July 3 of 1935. Jim married Frances Montgomery on April 23, 1955 in St. Peter's Church in Montgomery and together they had five children, Kathy, Kevin, Karen, Keith and James Jr. When Jim Sr. and Frances first got married Jim was stationed in Germany and then when he got out of the Army they lived in Bloomington for a short time and then moved to Indianapolis where Jim owned a gas station and was involved in several business ventures. Around 1982 Jim and Frances moved to Arizona and lived in Sun City. Jim went into the Real Estate Business as most of the kids were out on their own by then. Jim and Francis then continued to live in Sun City Arizona. About 2015 they developed health issues and Frances died after with cancer on September 5, 2017. Jim passed away a little over a year later on April 15, 2019. Both are buried there in Arizona.
- 2. Mary Jo "Michaels" Gaetano was the second child born to Gus and Josephine Michaels on Oct. 19, 1939. Mary Jo Graduated from Montgomery High School and then Graduated from St. Vincent School of Nursing (in Indianapolis) in 1960. She married Gene Gaetano on Oct. 28, 1961 in St. Peter's Church in Montgomery. Together they had four children, Gina, Lynda, Jim and Bob Gaetano. They lived all their married life on the north side of Chicago but had several homes and each time moved further north out of the city of Chicago. Mary Jo worked as a nurse nearly all her married life.
- 3. Thomas Patrick Michaels was the third child born to Gus and Josephine Michaels on December 12, 1941. Tom graduated from Montgomery High School in 1959 and then graduated from Indiana State University in Terre Haute Indiana. He first married Dorothy Patterson from Loogootee on September 14, 1964 and they had three sons, Tom, Rick and Mark Michaels. He first worked in Danville Illinois as an accountant before taking a job in the accounting department at Crane Naval Base Crane Indiana. He lived north of Loogootee for a few years and then bought a home southeast of Loogootee. After Tom & Dot divorced he married Sharon Boyd on October 9 of 1982 and they had two daughters Teresa and Denise. Sharon had also worked at Crane but when the children were born she stayed home to care for them. Tom & Sharon now have 14 Grandchildren and one great grandchild. Tom & Sharon built a home in the woods south of Loogootee on County Line Road. Tom retired from Crane but worked for a contracted for many years after that until he finally retired from Crane around 2018. He still finds plenty to do on his 27 acres.

4. Elizabeth Ann Michaels was the fourth child born to Gus and Josephine Michaels on March 2, 1947. Elizabeth grew up in Montgomery making her Frist Communion at St. Peters and attended grade school there. For a semester Liz attended the Academy of the Immaculate Conception in Ferdinand for her freshman year which was run by the Benedictine Nuns which prepared young girls for the convent. Liz then returned to Montgomery and graduated from Montgomery High School in 1965. She attended Vincennes University for a short time and then married Louis Kavanaugh on July 23, 1966 and together they had 5 children, Sheri, Louie III, Jim, Brian and John. Liz worked for a short time as a Nurses Aid at Daviess County Hospital but then Liz worked as a teacher's aid for from 1966 to 1970. She then worked for a short time at a textile factory in Loogootee but eventually decided when the kids came along she was a stay at home mom. She did do baby sitting in her home but when the kids were all in school she started working again and went back to work in various eateries before going back to work at the Daviess County Hospital. She worked there for about 30 years as a Certified Nurse's Assistant before she finally retired in 2015.

History of Gus Michaels, written by Teresa & Denise Michaels, Daughters of Tom & Sharon Michaels

The following history was written by Gus's Granddaughters after interviewing Gus Michaels in 1997 as a school project. Both granddaughters are married now and raising their families. Gus Michaels passed away on Jan. 25, 2001 after a car accident at the age of 98 years of age.

My Grandpa's name is James Augustine Michaels. He was born on September 9, 1902, to Louis J. and Mary Francis Michaels. He was born at his home in Daviess County, north of Montgomery. Grandpa couldn't remember how much he weighed, but he recalled the story told of how he fit in a shoe box and that they carried him around on a pillow. They said his head fit in a lea cup and he was fed by an eye dropper. He probably weighed around two pounds.

Grandpa was the eldest of eleven children. Two of the boys died the same day they were born. The two girls died at the ages of four and eight. One died from diphtheria, the other of scarlet fever. This left seven boys in the family. Grandpa started school at the age of seven. His favorite toy as a young boy was a home-made sled and a little wagon. He walked half a mile to a little one-room school.

He laughed as he remembered getting upset at another boy that was bothering the inkwell on his desk. After school, Grandpa chased him down the road. It had recently snowed, and it was slippery. As he turned around to see how close Grandpa was lo him, he slipped, lost his balance, and fell into the slushy ditch. Grandpa smiled and walked away. The boy never bothered him again.

He stayed there until the sixth grade. Then he went on to continue his schooling in Montgomery. He graduated high school in 1921. In the fall after high school, Grandpa borrowed three hundred dollars from his Aunt Ag and went to a telegraph school in Cincinnati, Ohio. Following his schooling, he went to work for Western Union. He then quit there and went to work for the B & O Railroad in Montgomery, Indiana. The depot building that Grandpa worked in was located at the end of a road. As a new employee, Grandpa did odd-and-end jobs such as Sweeping the floor, making a fire, taking out the ashes, billing the freight, and loading it. He earned one dollar a day.

In 1928, Grandpa took a leave of absence from the railroad and went to work for Remington Rand in Lincoln, Nebraska, because he didn't like the working conditions and only got paid thirty-two dollars a week. Remington Rand is a company that repairs adding machines and typewriters. It had better benefits. Since he was a repairman, he traveled a lot. Back then most of the roads were just dirt and gravel. He often made trips to Omaha and Hastings. In 1929 Grandpa bought his first car which was a Whippet. It was a greenish color and had a rumble seat. Grandpa always said that was why Grandma married him.

In 1930 Grandpa met Josephine Eleanor Laux. He was taking ballroom dancing lessons there in Lincoln, Nebraska, when he met her. Grandpa and the men there needed dancing partners. Jo and her friends decided to come and fill the places. **Grandpa and Jo soon began dating, but Grandpa was laid off in Lincoln and was sent to Oshkosh, Wisconsin, later in 1930.**

They corresponded by letters until they were married on August 21, 1934. They then went to live in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. On July 3, 1935, Grandma gave birth to their first son James Joseph. Mary Jo was born on October 19, 1939. A third child was born on December 12, 1941, and named Thomas Patrick, my dad. Grandpa worked there in Oshkosh until October of 1942 and moved back to Indiana to work for the railroad again.

They went to live on Grandpa's father's (Louis & Mary Frances, Gus's Dad) farm north of Montgomery. On the farm they grew crops, had hogs, and had two cows, Betsy and Rose Am. My dad said she was a good milker. He could hit the cat's mouth half-way across the barn! Sometimes Grandpa would have to leave to go to work at another depot and would be gone for two weeks at a lime. Grandma and the kids took care of the farm while he was away. While working for the railroad, Grandpa got free tickets to go to different places and he would take the family with him. They got to go from the east coast to the west coast!

They lived in a four room house with only electricity. They didn't have indoor plumbing, and a heating stove in the living room was all they had to heat the house. Grandpa and Grandma shared one bedroom. The three kids in another. The other two rooms were the kitchen and living room.

Elizabeth Ann was born on March 2, 1947. With two bedrooms and the four kids sharing one of them, Grandma decided it was time for a new house. To earn the money for the house, **Grandma went to work for NSWC Crane, Indiana, in 1950 as a clerk.** With both of them working **they built a house in 1956** in the outskirts of Montgomery. They now had indoor plumbing!

In the later 1950s, Grandma and Grandpa started square-dancing. They danced in the second floor or the old K of C building in Washington. They were kicked out of there because the owner said the building was rocking from side to side because of the dancing. They had a square-dance for fiftieth wedding anniversary celebration in 1984. **They quit square dancing after their fiftieth anniversary**.

Grandma retired from Crane in 1971 after twenty years of service. In 1972 Grandpa retired from the B & 0 Railroad after working for thirty years. He was seventy years old. Shortly thereafter, he went to work in the office of a local coal mine. Ten years later he retired again at age eighty.

Grandpa a never smoked or drank beer except for two times. Once when he was little and had a cold. his mother gave him a hot toddy. A hot toddy, which contained some whiskey, was a home remedy for a cold. The other time was after Grandpa and Grandma were married. She kept beer in the refrigerator for when visitors; came to their house. Grandma was gone, and Grandpa wanted to find out what was so good about it. He took one sip and the rest went down the drain.

Grandpa's mom died in 1938, and his dad died in 1963. The only brothers that are still alive are Orner age seventy-nine, Mack age seventy-eight, and Grandpa who will be ninety-five in September. Grandma and Grandpa celebrated their sixty-second wedding anniversary in August of 1990. Grandma died al 3:00 A.M. on December 13.1996. She was eighty-six years old.

Grandpa now lives alone in the same house built in 1956. He plants a huge garden every year and starts planning it around Valentine's Day. The whole family enjoys the produce from it.




Picture of Gus Michaels: We belief this picture was taken when James "Gus" Michaels was about 20 years old and the picture would have been taken about 1922.


Picture of Gus Michaels in July 4, 1926. I think this was taken at his Parents farm north of Montgomery. Gus would have been 23 years of age at the time.




