
Wedding Picture of Sam & Grace "Laux" Davis



Registration Card for Sam Davis: It shows on this card that Sam was 49 years of age when he registered for the draft as all men were required to do at that time. He was too old to be called up but I am sure he had several sons that did have to go during WW II. Sam was married to Grace "Laux" Davis and they had 6 Children.



Death Certificate for Grace "Laux" Davis: Shown above is the Death Certificate for Grace Davis who passed away on Dec. 8, 1970, at the home of her niece, Elizabeth "Michaels" Kavanaugh in Montgomery, Indiana. There was a private viewing for the family the following night before the body was transferred to Lincoln, Nebraska for the Funeral. After the funeral, it was shipped ahead to California for burial. Grace was buried with her husband in a Fort Rosecrans, National Cemetery near Vista, California. Grace was the daughter of Joseph & Maude Laux.

Interment Card for Sam Davis, who is buried in Fort Rosecrans National Cemetery near San Diego, California. Sam Served in the military from May, 1917 to May 22, 1918. Grace Davis, his wife, is also buried there in the same plot. Sam died on Nov. 5, 1954 and Grace died on Dec. 8. 1970.

Grace "Laux" Davis and two Children: Pictured here, is Grace Davis as she holds her son, Charles while on the left is her first born which we think is Catherine, who died at a very early age. We don't know when Catherine was born or when she died or where she was buried. The story has been told of Catherine, when she narrowly missed being kidnapped. This story was told to us by Josephine "Laux" Michaels and verified by Mary Helen Lesneski, her sister. The story goes, Grace had sent her to the store just a block away for a small item and when she failed to come home, Grace, her mother, went looking for her and saw an older man leading her down the alley. When Grace shouted at him to stop, he started running away and let go of little Catherine. Grace chased him for a little while with Catherine at her side but lost him. Grace prevented what could have been a very tragic situation. Catherine died at a very early age, about 5 years old we think. This is the only picture we have of Catherine.

Picture of **Grace "Laux" Davis** (Back Row Left) **and three of her children**, Charlie and Mary Helen and in front is Jerry. Picture taken in the early 1940's.



This is a picture of **Sam Davis**, who was married to Grace "Laux" Davis, taken in the kitchen at the Tropical Court when they lived in California sometime in the 1940's. Sam & Grace had five children, Charlie, Jimmie, Kathleen, Mary Helen and Jerry. Sam passed away Nov. 5, 1954.

Pictured right, are the **two Davis Girls**, **Mary Helen on the left and Kathleen on the right.** Mary Helen later married Ed Lesneski and Kathleen married Orville Wilkerson. They were the daughters of Sam and Grace Davis. They had three brothers, Charlie, James and Gerald and one sister who died when she was about 5 years old. The Family had lived in Lincoln, Nebraska before moving to Oceanside,






Left, **Charles Davis**: This picture was taken from his college year book and is his freshman photo.










Left: This is a picture of the home where Louie & Frances Knopp lived in Lincoln, Nebraska.

I am sure the inside of the house has changed somewhat but the outside has not. This home was close to St. Patrick's School and the next block is St. Patrick's Catholic Church, in which they were regular members.

Miss Marguerite Harrahill and Miss Elizabeth Laux of Havelock will leave Monday for Greenville, Fy., to become members of the Dominican sisterhood and will teach in the parochial school there. Miss Harrahill is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Harrahill and Miss Laux is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Laux.

Elizabeth Laux Enters the Convent as a Dominican Nun. Here is a Newspaper clipping stating that Elizabeth Laux is leaving for Greenville, Kentucky to enter the Dominican Order. She later entered the Convent there as a Nun and she took the name of Sister Athanasia Laux. Elizabeth entered the Academy in Feb. of 1922 and took her first vows on March 7 of 1924. She is the daughter of Joseph and Maude Laux of Lincoln Nebraska.

Eulogy that was given for Aunt Elizabeth "Laux", Sister Athanasia:

Today we gather to celebrate the life, death and Resurrection of Sister Athanasia Elizabeth Laux. Life as we all realize has many components, many age periods, many compartments marked "People who are important to me." The life of Sister Athanasia following the rule. Her life was a gift to many. She started out as an early Christmas present to Joseph and Maude Young Laux, bring born on the 1st of December 1905 in Lincoln, Nebraska.

She grew up in Havelock with brothers, Charles and Joseph and sisters, Grace, Josephine, Mary, Rosa and Frances who were also at one time part of the St. Catharine Community. All, no doubt, except Mary and Rosa were on hand to greet her last week as she entered the fullness of eternal life. Rosa still resides in Denver, and Mary in Lincoln. Athi's love for her family and great joy at being able to travel to visit them was well known. In fact, after 1975 the only thing she noted on her summer agenda was travel and visit relatives.

"It was not you who chose me, but it was I who chose you". As we hear these words in this morning's Gospel, we remember that it was early in life, that Jesus chose to call Elizabeth Laux into religious life. It was that same **Jesus**, **who chose Sister Athanasius Elizabeth Laux for eternal life on November 12, 1997**, the original feast of All Dominican Saints.

After only one year and a half at Cathedral High School in Lincoln, Elizabeth transferred to St. Catharine Academy in February of 1922 at the age of sixteen. In September of that year, she entered the Postulate at St. Catharine's and made her first vows on March 7, 1924. She obtained her high school diploma from St. Catharine's Academy, and a bachelor's degree from Siena College. She also studied at Boston College and Catholic University in Washington, D.C. Sister worked in the field of education in Massachusetts, New York, Illinois, Arkansas, and Kentucky.

Finally in 1947 she returned to Nebraska where she earned a Lifetime Teachers' Certificate and ministered until 1967. (In 1967) Thirty years ago this fall, she moved to St. Catharine Convent in McCook and into an apostolate of prayer. In 1991 after having open heart surgery, she came to reside in Sansbury Infirmary.


The entrance song of this liturgy was "Be not Afraid". The basis of this song is the Biblical citation from Isaiah 43, which will also be the first reading of today's liturgy. This reading had special meaning in the life of Sister Athanaius. She was an avid reader of the Bible and realistically would find here the help she needed to deal with her fears. Fear, as we know is simply an emotion. It is not something we ask for, plan for, have any control of possession. Athi had many fears. She was afraid of hospitals,

operations, illness, and death. However, how a person handles one's fear is most important. Sister Athanasia Laux was a master at dealing with her fears. First, to the consternation of some, she admitted her fears, and then she faced them. One night a few years ago, I visited her room. She had already lost one leg as a result of diabetes, and the doctors were trying to decide about the other leg. Forthrightly she said, "I don't want to lose my other leg. Pray that I don't lose my other leg." I prayed as did many others, and Athi lost her other leg. I think however, that our prayer was not unheard, for I have never known a person who could handle such a great loss so well.

There were of course, moments of self-pity and anger, but most often Sister Athanasius produced for us a happy smile and delightful giggle. She was in the words of some of her friends at Sansbury, a great example and an inspiration to us. Her ability to be joyous in the midst of great immobility and in the last moments of great pain has been a stimulus for us all.

As we pray, the responsorial psalm this morning, let us picture Sister Athanasius as she, at the moment of her death, realized the real truth behind these words that she had prayed so often. Let us picture our God leading her into the way of life eternal. As we hear the words of St. John's Gospel, let us marvel at God's unconditional love for each of us as we hear those words, "Live on in my love." But let us also be even more aware that Jesus is most serious in his mandate, "The command I give you is this, that you love one another."











This is the Obituary for Elizabeth "Fenton" Reynolds, who is the daughter of Richard & Rosa "Laux" Fenton. Elizabeth's Mother, Rosa Fenton, is a sister to Josephine "Laux" Michaels so Elizabeth "Betty Kay" as she was referred to would have been a first cousin to Elizabeth "Michaels" Kavanaugh of Montgomery, Indiana. Betty Kay Reynolds was born on November 11 of 1947 and died on May 30, 2020 near Denver, Colorado where she lived all her life.

Elizabeth Katherine Reynolds was born November 11, 1947, in Denver CO, at Porter's Hospital -- The fourth of seven children. She attended Catholic schools from the age of five until Graduation from St. Francis De Sales in 1965.

Elizabeth loved her family and was the proud Grandma of 12 Grandchildren, Finley, Jackson, Ethan, Grace, Caleb, Noah, Brady, Jacob, Lucas, Rowan, Quinnley and Harlow.

She is survived by her husband, Jim Reynolds, brothers, Joe Fenton, and Larry Fenton, sisters, Kathy Ahroon and Mary Lou Fenton, Sons, Chris Reynolds and his wife Bobbie Reynolds, Nick Reynolds and his wife, Rachel Reynolds, Mike Reynolds and his, wife Liv Reynolds, and daughters, Kelly Archuleta and Jamie Reynolds.
